Member Spotlight: Creature Comforts Brewing Co.

Creature Comforts Brewing Co. (CCBC), a brewery based out of Athens, GA, operates four facilities in the Athens area: a taproom and innovation brewery in the downtown district, a large-scale production brewery, a



storage warehouse, and corporate headquarters. The production brewery achieved TRUE Zero Waste certification in 2022, and the taproom achieved TRUE Zero Waste certification in 2025.

Creature Comforts deploys multiple strategies and initiatives to maintain the high diversion rates required by TRUE certification. To create accurate measurements of waste generation and recycling rates, CCBC employees developed a process that can read production datasets and output expected waste materials from the brewing process. To better waste management within their facilities, CCBC places emphasis on employee education and waste collection system design. Every CCBC employee goes through an onboarding process that includes education on waste management within their job roles and responsibilities. Support for employees continues beyond onboarding, with dedicated Slack channels (internally named #trashtalk) for providing guidance on how to recycle or dispose of items. CCBC tries to influence customer behavior in their taprooms in multiple ways. Customers purchasing beer receive their drinks in reusable, washable glasses, and water cups are deployed near recycling bins to encourage recycling. Waste bins are deployed in trios and are labeled and color-coded and are strategically located so that customers are never more than 50 feet from a set of bins. NAIMA Announces Georgia Pilot

An innovative new pilot project in Georgia will help the home insulation industry achieve a key sustainability goal: reducing hard-to-recycle plastics that end up in landfills. The program, called "The Plastic Take Back Program", is led by the North American Insulation Manufacturers Association (NAIMA), whose members include some of the largest insulation manufacturers in the world, and Installed Building Products (IBP), one of the nation's largest installers of insulation and complementary building materials. NAIMA's largest members — CertainTeed, Knauf, John Mansville, Owens Corning, and

ROCKWOOL— serve Metro Atlanta homeowners and plan to participate in the program. "Georgia and Alabama are a manufacturing hub for the fiberglass insulation industry, and our companies are united in the goal of finding recycling solutions that work in our operations," said Curt Rich, CEO of NAIMA. "By reclaiming and recycling LLDPE packaging, we are turning what was once considered waste into a resource."
